
It's that time of year again. Remember to change your clocks before going to bed on Saturday night (11/3).



Why Make a Faith Commitment?

This question has been asked for over one hundred years in the United States. Yes, it has been a long time since congregational leaders started asking members to make a pledge, faith commitment or provide an estimate of giving. Today we estimate about twothirds of ELCA congregations ask members to make some form of financial commitment each year. We estimate

Pastor's thoughts....

Some weeks ago, I received a call from my friend, Rabbi Bloom of Temple Beth Yam, here on the island. He asked if I would be willing to partner with him and other community leaders in forming what is now the Lowcountry Coalition Against

Hate, a nonpartisan alliance advocating against prejudice and bias and promoting compassion and justice. Since I know and trust the Rabbi, and since I support the platform, I agreed. The coalition has grown legs and is becoming a rallying point for a congregations that ask members to make a faith commitment have 30% higher giving than those who do not. We estimate 90% of households that make an annual commitment fulfill that commitment.

So, why make a faith commitment? Here are some basic reasons:

- A faith commitment shows that God is first in our life! This means recognizing that God is owner, not us. We live in a covenant relationship with God based on faith and trust, not a contractual relationship based on services or prosperity.
- A faith commitment represents a household's disciplined response to God's gifts - life, a Savior and acceptance into the Body of Christ. This is one way we show our gratitude, respect, loyalty and obedience.
- A faith commitment enables each household to make intentional decisions. Just as a household plans other commitments, a commitment of regular giving to God's work through our congregation faithfully fulfills one way each person responds to God's commitment to us through grace.
- A faith commitment enables a congregation to plan. As a church family, we have expenses and make commitments to others leaders, lenders, suppliers. A commitment from each household allows congregational leaders to responsibly plan for and meet financial obligations, which help us do ministry together.
- Christians lead by example. When someone makes a faith commitment, it is setting an example of discipleship for others family, peers, community. This commitment becomes part of each person's witness and testimony to Jesus Christ.

Some people start making a faith commitment at a very early age, often when they were confirmed. Some people start making a commitment when joining wide variety of folks, and has taken on greater significance, in light of the recent shootings.

On Tuesday, LCAH sponsored a forum to which the candidates for mayor of Hilton Head were invited to answer specific questions about moral leadership and building a safer, more inclusive community. The questions centered on the importance of speaking out against hate in all its forms, what they would do to combat hate speech and actions, and why community leaders should be held to a higher standard of conduct. The forum was held in the PSD Community Room and was so full of people that the fire marshal nearly had a heart attack!

The six candidates were present and fielded a number of specific questions on the aforementioned topics, pre-planned by the Coalition, but unknown to the candidates. No party affiliations were made, and there was no language supporting or condemning the current administration. The moderators did a great job of trying to keep the focus on governmental management of Hilton Head Island.

Generally, the candidates' responses were rather vanilla...meaning they contained a lot of fluff, but it was still an opportunity to get a better understanding of their hearts and what they would do to promote cooperation and mutual respect on the island.

I will say this about the candidates whom I encountered: If you are considering voting for Steve Santomauro, please see me or call me before Tuesday.

In other news, we had a great Oktoberfest last Saturday, and I would like to thank everyone who pitched in to make it a fun event. All the free will offerings are going to be matched by Thrivent and sent to Lutheran Disaster Relief.

We're in our final week of prayerful preparation for Consecration Sunday on November 11. You should have received information about it in the mail. I do hope we'll ALL fill out a card and bring it to the altar, or place it in the offering plate. If you are unable to be in worship on the 11th, you are invited and encouraged to submit your card this week, or sometime in the following couple of weeks, mail it in, or drop it off. This is an important worship exercise, which also has a practical application, in that it allows our A&F Team to work our spending plan for next year.

Single-Use Plastic Carryout Bag Law Goes Into Effect November 1, 2018

YOU WON'T WANT TO MISS THIS!!! LIMITED AVAILABILITY!!

As you have probably heard, a "single use" plastic bag ban has gone effect (as of Nov. 1) in Beaufort County. Plastic bags considered disposable and not reusable are prohibited. This includes all disposable plastic bags provided at checkout or point-of-sale referencing bags commonly used to carry groceries, takeout food and clothing.

To support this effort, we have teamed with the Preschool to have a bag created for you to use. Each side of the bag shows the logo for CLC and the Preschool. By using this bag, you will help our environment and also be promoting our church and preschool families. We will have **two bags per family** (*while supplies last*) available in the narthex.

Below is a brief recap from our October 2018 Council Meeting.

- We approved the minutes from our September 25th meeting.
- Reviewed and approved staff and ministry reports.
- We have staffed and approved a Nominating Ministry Team per our constitution. Christ Lutheran continues as one of four packing sites for the Back Pack Buddies program. For eight years the Hunger Coalition of the Lowcountry, through their flagship program Back Pack Buddies, has worked in three Hilton Head elementary schools to ensure that hungry children have supplemental food over the weekend. It takes many volunteers to pack and distribute this food to 280 children.

There are several new food support programs getting off the ground at Deep Well. One initiative is in response to a request from the Hunger Coalition and the HHI Creative Arts Elementary School to provide a daily snack to several at risk classes of students from late October through the end of the school year. The other initiative is a new food support program partnered with The Children's Center. This weekend food program will provide 50 bags per week

to the neediest working families using the daycare provided by the Children's Center. Once details and needs are worked out, food items for these programs will be added to the monthly donation "shopping lists" CLC hands out in the bulletins or places in the Narthex. The Wellness Pantry at Deep Well continues to see heavy activity with 198 adults and 161 children under the age of 18 served for the month of September 2018. All donations from CLC are gratefully received; not all churches on Hilton Head contribute on a monthly basis to the Pantry the way the congregation of CLC does. Well done!!! 



CLC Book Club - Join us on Saturday, November 17, 2018




