


WEDNESDAYS: May 1,8 & 15

Greetings Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

A regularly scheduled meeting of the Christ Lutheran Church Council was held on April 16 at 6:30 p.m. in Heinrich Hall. Following are highlights of the meeting:

- Council considered and approved request to fund replacement of air conditioning unit that supports Heinrich Hall. It is located behind the kitchen/preschool area. Estimated cost is around \$10,000.
- Council considered and approved request to fund attendance to Future of the Church seminar in Denver, Colorado for Silke Pyrlik, Director of Christian Life and two Council members.
- The A&F Ministry Team is working with insurance companies to resolve claims for roof damage and flood damage.
- Renovation and Capital Campaign Teams completed the fund drive raising commitments totaling \$668,000. Renovation team will meet on May 2 to formulate recommendation to Council of how to proceed with the Renovation project.
- Thank you to John and Janet Garnjost for their many years of service as Tellers. Doug and Ann Hamnes, as well as Carol Benton, Suzy Maklous and Lynn Baglyos are being trained to join the Teller team. Thank you to all for their service in this important ministry of the Church.
- Strategic Planning Session is scheduled for Saturday, June 8. Preparations for the session are underway.

Back Pack Buddies 2018-19

This year our church has participated in the Back Pack Buddies program supplying 85 kids at Hilton Head Elementary School each week with two breakfasts and two lunches for the weekend. This food is provided through monetary donations and grants to The Hunger Coalition and includes 2 cereals, 2 fruit cups, 2 granola bars, 2 entrees, a pudding and 2 pieces of fresh fruit. An additional 180 kids are also in the program at Early Childhood Center and the Creative Arts Elementary through the involvement of other churches.

Bill & Julie Valienti and Ray Stickel pick up the food once a month to bring it to our church (just under 7000 pounds of food.)


of couples and singles from both worship services, and visitors and new members are always welcome.
