Dear Church, Dear Families: I hope you had a good Thanksgiving and that you were able to celebrate

the gifts of life whether with a houseful of people or in a quiet place by yourself. At this time of year, we realize that "church time" is different from "cultural time." A Thanksgiving meal is an American celebration. The

Christian community has a celebration meal every Sunday called "The Eucharist", which is the Greek word for Thanksgiving.

As church folk, we are also preparing to celebrate the beginning of a new church year as this one ends with St. Andrew's Day on November 30. The church enters its new year well before the secular calendar does on January 1st. In our gospel readings, beginning with the First Sunday of Advent, we will move from the Gospel of Luke back to the Gospel of Matthew. While the culture is all glittered-out for Christmas, the Church uniquely enters this more reflective, sometimes somber, season of Advent.

As Christians, we can observe Advent at home as well as at church, even if we have already decorated our homes and have planned holiday parties. I encourage you as I am encouraging the preschool families, to observe Advent at home in the following ways:

- Purchase or make an Advent wreath. Use blue or white candles for the Sundays and weeks of Advent. If making a wreath seems too much, just gather four candles from around your home and put them in a circle.
- Make plans to gather daily, beginning on the first Sunday of Advent, for a time to reflect on the gift of love God shared with all people. Continue this gathering throughout the twelve days of Christmas.
- Decide what kinds of things your daily gathering will include. Decide on a time, such as morning, evening, or mealtime, to meet. Suggested table prayers are provided below for gatherings that take place at mealtime. Decide who will light and snuff out the candles.
- For this First Week in Advent, light one candle every day (maybe at your evening meal) and use this prayer and these readings to center your devotion:

Week 1 Prayer to accompany the candle lighting

Lord Jesus, we do not lack any spiritual gift as we wait for your coming. Keep us awake and help us use our gifts to serve those who look for the dawn of your justice and mercy. Amen.

Week 1 Table Prayer

Advent Bible Study Series

How Do Lutherans Interpret the Bible?

Part 1 by Pastor Mary Anderson



It all started with the Easter Egg Hunt at my congregation last year. Some

anxious-looking grandmothers who regularly attend one of the adult Sunday School classes came up to me while the kids were hunting eggs and said, "We're worried about our Sunday School lesson tomorrow." That was odd and unexpected. "Show me," I said. Several went to their classroom and showed me the participant book for the Bible study they were doing. It was a small series on the Pastoral Epistles (1 and 2 Timothy and Titus) and they turned to the up-coming chapter on the text from 1 Timothy 2: 11-15 that says: 11Let a woman learn in silence with full submission. 12I permit no woman to teach or to have authority over a man; she is to keep silent. 13For Adam was formed first, then Eve; 14and Adam was not deceived, but the woman was deceived and became a transgressor. 15Yet she will be saved through childbearing, provided they continue in faith and love and holiness, with modesty.

One of the discussion questions for the class to ponder said this: "Discuss why women should not be pastors and why it can be harmful to the church."

I turned the book over to the back cover to see who the publisher was. As I suspected, it was a series published by Concordia, the publishing arm of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod denomination. As you probably know, the LCMS does not allow the ordination of women and is often reluctant to have lay women in leadership roles of any kind, including teaching Sunday School.

This Advent Bible Study on Lutheran Interpretation of the Bible is an adaptation of a six-Sunday series I prepared and lead in that adult Sunday School class for all of the Easter season in 2019. I used this 1 Timothy text on women's silence as the central piece of scripture for this series. However, it is difficult to speak about a "Lutheran" way of interpreting the Bible since obviously different Lutheran denominations do not agree. As members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, we probably have more in common with United Methodists, Episcopalians and Moravians than we do with our siblings in the Missouri Synod. So, in all honesty, this series represents more of an ELCA Lutheran way of interpreting scripture than it does simply a Lutheran way. Much of this method of interpreting the Bible does come from Martin Luther. This way of understanding scripture is also what guides our discernment and our decision-making around social issues, economic concerns, and ethical questions that are not explicitly addressed in scripture. Obviously, the Bible doesn't directly speak to concerns and dilemmas raised by our advanced technology such as invitro fertilization or cloning or smart phones.

A college freshman once told me she found a brochure on a table in a waiting room with the title, "What the Bible Says About the Internet." She laughed at the very idea and said to me, "I'm pretty sure the Bible doesn't say a thing about the internet!" But inside that brochure were listed several scripture passages that supposedly did just that. I looked up a few of them and could not even imagine what kind of connection was being attempted between those scriptures and possible ethical/moral concerns about communication technology in the 21st C.

But the point is, someone else did. Somebody or some faith community used a method of interpreting scripture so that they made the connection. It's not that scripture is "up for grabs" but it is up for interpretation in every time and place. While fundamentalists seek to be very literal in their interpretation of the Bible and reduce it to a bumper sticker - "The Bible says it. I believe it. That settles it", and the secularists are convinced scripture is just a bunch of old myths and irrelevant stories; Lutherans seek a middle way. We believe God's living Word is revealed in scripture and that it is constantly relevant for us and for every age.

So over the following four weeks, I'll be unpacking the following Five Principles and their accompanying questions. These principles are at the heart of our Lutheran interpretation of the Bible:

1. *Law and Gospel* [How does this scripture reveal my brokenness and how does it offer me healing and hope?]

2. What Shows Forth Christ? [How do I see Christ in this part of scripture?]

3. Scripture Interprets Scripture [How does this scripture connect to the overall biblical story?]

4. *The Plain Meaning of the Text* [How would the first hearers of this scripture have understood it?]
5. *Public Interpretation* [How might someone in a completely different life situation interpret this scripture?]

All through this series, we'll use that Easter-egg hunt scripture from 1 Timothy and apply these

principles to it. Remember that God's Word is a living thing. We may start by asking "what did it mean" but the final question must be "what does it mean for us right now?"

Next week, we'll begin with Principle 4: The Plain Meaning of the Text. Thanks for giving me your feedback and for sharing your story with scripture along this journey!

Dear Christ Lutheran Church Family,

The Christ Lutheran Church Council met at a regularly called meeting on Tuesday, November 19 at 6:30pm. Following is a summary of that meeting:

- Bishop Yoos of the ELCA South Carolina Synod attended our meeting and delivered our opening devotion and prayer. Bishop Yoos spoke to us about reconciliation and asked us to share ways we are experiencing reconciliation at CLC today. Bishop also spoke to us about Abortion and Human Sexuality as social statements, as well as the Sanctuary memorial that was introduced from the floor at the Churchwide Assembly in August. Please note Bishop's letter to our congregation regarding the Resolution and Etter that was mailed to the congregation on September 30, 2019. To read the letter and Resolution <u>click here.</u> Bishop Yoos will be at Christ Lutheran to preach at one service at 10:00am on Sunday, January 12 and visit with the congregation at Brunch to be held directly after the service.
- Council reviewed the results of Consecration Sunday. Current result as of Monday, November 25 is receipt of 54 cards that total \$198,904 in commitments from the congregation. We are hopeful that more cards will be turned in over the next few weeks so that the A&F committee can prepare a budget for our Annual Meeting that will be held on February 2 between services.
- Rita Hungate, chairperson of the Nominating Committee reported that there are no volunteers to fill the two vacant seats on Council. With 5 current members standing for re-election and 5 continuing members, the Council meets our Constitutional requirement C12.01 that the Congregation Council shall consist of the pastor, the officers (President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer) and not more than eight or fewer than five members of the congregation. A Congregation Meeting to elect the 5 members for re-election, which include

Susan Fidler, Leslie Heavener, Kathy Reynolds, Gary Reynolds and Phyllis Rowe, will be held before the Preschool Christmas Pageant at 9:30am on Sunday, December 8 in the Church Sanctuary. Notice of that meeting will be mailed on November 26, 2019.

- Council discussed the progress of the Ad Hoc Committee and noted that the Lutheran Denomination Comparison document and supporting information will be mailed on Saturday, November 23.
- Council discussed the Town Hall Meeting that is scheduled for December 10 at 6:00pm in Heinrichs Hall. The purpose of this meeting will be to offer information regarding the Christ Lutheran Church Constitution and By-Law requirements for the process of disaffiliation.
- Council voted to call a Special Congregation Meeting on Sunday, January 19, 2020 at 11:45am in Heinrichs Hall to vote on the ELCA affiliation of Christ Lutheran Church. Notice of that meeting will be mailed in accordance with our Constitution and By-Laws.
- Rita Hungate reported that she has scheduled a Security Training session on January 7, 2020 from 5:30pm to 7:30pm in Heinrichs Hall. Council Members, Preschool Director and Teachers, Choir Members and other interested parties are urged to attend. A light supper of Pizza and Salad will be served.
- Joe reported that our new Parish Administrator, Linda Sheetz, joined us on November 18 and Barbara Klatt will be with her for two weeks for training. Welcome Linda!
- Council approved a flexible work schedule for Silke Pyrlik to care for Manfred.

On behalf of the South Carolina Synod Council members, we are writing to let you know that your letter was read aloud to our Synod Council members on Monday, November 18, 2019, at our regularly scheduled meeting. We listened intently to your words. We heard your feelings and beliefs. We engaged in a 45-minute conversation about your letter. We prayed for each one of Jesus' disciples in your church community.

We hear you. Your thoughts, feelings, concerns, and disagreement are known by our Synod Council leadership and your letter and statements in full will be sent to the Church Council, Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA), so that they too can hear you.

We, as a Synod Council, discussed our own differences on the understanding of the term "sanctuary" and we were concerned about the process of this controversial term adopted from the floor of the 2019 ELCA Churchwide Assembly at a time when our nation is so divided. Overall, we agree that as the body of Christ means that we can be in different places on an issue; we don't have to agree on every issue. Thus, we can still love one another and be in a Christ centered community and vote differently.

Daily living into our baptismal faith is not always easy, but Jesus did not promise us that. Yet, through listening and living among all of God's faithful people we learn here Jesus' promise to us that he will be with us, he will help us, and he will not forsake us.

We have heard you and we want to continue to listen and live among you as God's faithful people. In Christ's unconditional love,


