Some of the things I heard from some folks in the midst of our difficult conversation, had to do with being unaware of what was being said and done in the synod and the churchwide expression. Some distress had to do with various social statements that the church studies, writes, discusses, and votes on to teach about a particular subject and to provide guidance to congregations, synods, and church institutions.

Moving forward, I will continue to publish some news and information coming from other expressions of our church. This keeps you informed, and it allows us to stay in conversation about various topics that affect church and society. So, I am printing for you today a letter to all of us that came a few days ago from Bishop Eaton regarding the increase on the U.S. travel ban against majority Muslim countries. For one thing, it speaks directly to our topic this Wednesday night on refugee resettlement and is very timely for the CONNECTED group. Another is that Tanzania is one of the countries under a ban. As South Carolina Lutherans, we are a partner synod with the Southwest Diocese of Tanzania, and regularly have synodical trips there. Another reason is that this response speaks out of our Lutheran tradition and our gospelcentered theology. Throughout this letter, a number of our social statements are sited that speak to this issue. Notice, too, the deep history we have as American Lutherans in refugee resettlement. Much of this work is happening now through Lutheran Services Carolinas, specifically in the Columbia area.

I plan to regularly publish important communications from our South Carolina synod and from the ELCA churchwide offices. But there are plenty of ways for you to keep up as well. There is a weekly email from the South Carolina synod office that you can subscribe to on their website, scsynod.com. I encourage you to subscribe to the "Living Lutheran" magazine, our award-winning churchwide publication, that I think, gets better and better through the years. All of these are wonderful ways to stay connected to the various parts of our church here in the U.S. and globally. I also encourage you to visit regularly the ELCA website (elca.org) where there is abundant information, resources, and ministry ideas.

I will miss seeing you this Sunday, but look forward to being back with you on Sunday, February 16th. Hopefully, I'll have a bit of a tan!



A Message from Bishop Eaton

"When an alien resides with you in your land, you shall not oppress the alien. The alien who resides with you shall be to you as the citizen among you; you shall love the alien as yourself, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt: I am the LORD your God." (Leviticus 19:33-34)

Dear Church,

Last week, on the third anniversary of the original executive order, the administration extended the travel ban to the United States from seven majority Muslim countries to thirteen. The ban suspends the issuing of immigrant visas that can lead to permanent residency for those from Eritrea, Kyrgyzstan, Myanmar and Nigeria, as well as visas available through a diversity lottery for applicants from Sudan and Tanzania. This announcement comes on the heels of several other rule changes restricting travel to the U.S.

As Lutherans, these actions should concern us. Through the life, death and resurrection of Jesus, God has set us free from ourselves to serve our neighbor. This expanded policy separates families from loved ones already here. Further, it prevents people - especially those escaping perilous or lifethreatening situations in several of these nations from coming to safety in the U.S. It does not enhance our safety or reflect our vocation as Christians.

Our church has a strong history of hospitality for refugees and immigrants. After World War II, when one out of every six Lutherans in the world was a refugee or displaced person, Lutherans resettled some 57,000 refugees in the United God's peace as we prepare for Sunday and another week of ministry, Pastor Mary

States (ELCA social message on "<u>Immigration</u>"). Today, with more than 60 million displaced people in the world, we continue God's work of welcoming refugees through advocacy and our vital partnership with <u>Lutheran Immigration and</u> <u>Refugee Service</u>.

The ELCA also has companion Lutheran churches in many of these countries that are, with us, member churches of <u>The Lutheran World</u> <u>Federation</u> (LWF). (In several instances our church has developed strong partnerships with these churches over many decades.) The current president of the LWF, with whom I serve as a vice-president, is archbishop of the Lutheran Church of Christ in Nigeria. The Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania is one of the world's fastest- growing Lutheran churches. Accompaniment of these ELCA partners requires our solidarity and advocacy with them.

The expanded policy also reflects racial and religious discrimination. Over the past three years, the targeting of Muslims has had a direct and negative impact on our interfaith partners, who are harmed not only by the policy, but by the rhetoric surrounding it. Together with other Christians and Jews, we are standing with Muslims through the Shoulder to Shoulder Campaign. We are inviting advocacy as a means for helping those affected now, while preventing discrimination in the future. This is one way of embodying our commitment to opposing "all forms of religious bigotry, violence, discrimination. and persecution and stand in solidarity with those who experience them, whether they are Christian or of another religion or worldview" ("A Declaration of Inter-Religious Commitment: A Policy Statement of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America").

The travel ban and its extension do not promote our values of mutual respect of all God's children, each created in God's image. Furthermore, these bans contradict our church's and our nation's commitments to be a place of welcome and safety for others. Federal courts have recognized this already by blocking significant portions of the ban, finding them discriminatory, anti-Muslim or unconstitutional.

The ELCA social statement "For Peace in God's World" reminds us that "the church is a disturbing presence when it refuses to be silent and instead speaks the truth." On this policy, we as Lutherans cannot be silent. The history of our church, the life-giving relationships we share with other Lutherans worldwide, and our commitments to and with inter-religious partners are the basis not only for our concern - but for our continued accompaniment, advocacy and action. LOCAL MISSION: DEEP WELL

CLC supports the Deep Well Project as an outreach arm of the church. Deep Well is a very important local social service organization, giving assistance to some of the neediest and most vulnerable local island residents. It was founded over 40 years ago by one of CLC's early members, Charlotte Heinrichs. It receives no governmental funding and over 90% of monetary

donations goes to client services.



Over the holidays, the Deep Well Project served over 600 Hilton Head Island children with new toys and clothes. Many CLC members contributed to the Santa Shop, either through donations or through their time. Thank you! Deep Well served Christmas Dinners to 89 island families through the Pantry. Another 107 families were coordinated for other groups, totaling 196 island families got their Christmas Dinner through Deep Well services.
