It's highly likely the problem isn't you!


Now that we have been physically distancing for over a month and now that Holy Week and Easter are behind us, I anticipate that the pull to "get this over with" and "get back to normal" will be stronger than ever. Pastorally, I'm also concerned that our sense of loneliness and depression will increase as well. Please be on watch for those sadnesses in your life and reach out for help.

We don't know what "normal" may look like, but since we don't know how long it might be before we can come together for worship, Sunday School, meetings, and fellowship; it's time to settle into a "new normal." We are already doing that to some extent with Council conference call meetings, Zoom worship, confirmation classes, and book group gatherings, etc. We can also think about how to continue with Sunday School classes, committee meetings, Connected, and other faith formation opportunities. All are possible, we just have to stay creative!

Starting this week, I'm going to be thinking more about how to provide some other teaching opportunities on-line. For example, the ELCA has begun the process of putting together a new social message on the question, "What is a faithful Lutheran response regarding citizenship and civic engagement?" This was asked for at the 2019 Assembly back in August. We were just sent a draft of this message statement and the ELCA is asking for our feedback on it. I'll be looking for ways for us to do this together and complete the survey.

In this joyful Eastertide, we are strengthened in the good news that Christ is risen, indeed. Alleluia, y'all!

After my admittance last week that it might be grief; the feeling of pain, fear, anger, irritation, impatience, disorientation, I used the week after Easter to feel into this added grief.

I actually re-watched the movie "Contagion" to see how I feel about it today. And wow, it is so accurate, as if they knew how to predict the future. But of course pandemic specialists have always known that it would go this way. It is a scientifically well researched movie.

So how do I feel about the fact that a disaster movie that I really liked and thought



was fiction actually became reality?

I guess I have to admit that it surprised me, grieves me, and has me deeply in thought.

This week I read in a Spiritual Direction resource about the frailty of life. No kidding! This pandemic really reminds us that life is precious and frail, especially at an older age.

Of course we all know that we will die one day, that's the one thing we all can count on in the future. The only thing we know for sure!

There is one big plus to aging, getting older, becoming more frail... namely that one can and should learn to pull from an inner strength and wisdom that is not the privilege of youth but of age!

I spent a lot of time this week to go within. I prayed more and longer, I sat longer in mediation, I contemplated life and age. (Yes, I admit the big five zero is somewhat intimidating for me. I'm also aware most of you just laughed out loud:-)

Spending time with God always helps me to calm down, to center and to find my inner peace. It restores hope, every single time. I am grateful for the opportunity I am given, as a spiritual director, to spend quite some time reading great spiritual writers, contemplate and being a spiritual companion to my directees.

I get to spend a tremendous amount of time with God just by "doing my job".

After last week's emotionally tumultuous week I appreciated the slower pace of this week. The time to read and pray. I like to pull from my inner strength and I like to train my inner wisdom and intuition. My grief can be soothed by going within, by knowing whose I am, by feeling that I am part of creation, part of the one big picture! By feeling loved, I am calmed and hope springs from within. Hope for life, for healing, for the resurrection of all that is good and worthy.

How about you? Have you found a new, slower rhythm? Do you appreciate the "time off"? Are you using it wisely? Are you building up your inner strength? Can you find your inner calm and wisdom?

One of my directees just mentioned to me that she is contemplating John 17 this week. I recommend it to all of you! Especially this week after HE IS RISEN!

Jesus is praying to his Father on behalf of his disciples. And since we all consider ourselves his disciples, it is a good chapter to contemplate.


We are still offering a contemplative prayer time every Monday at 9:30 a.m.

Thank you CLC for all the donations that were brought to the church this last Tuesday!


